Janet Yieh Comes to First Pres

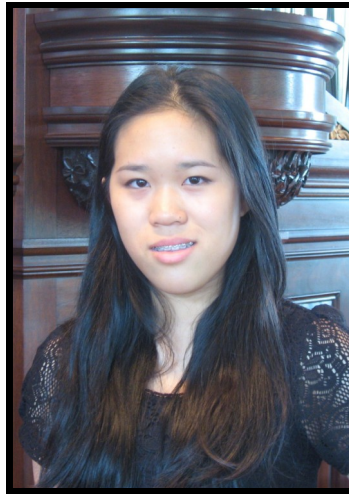
First Presbyterian Church is pleased to announce a special series of recitals for 2010-2011. The "Young Artists' Series," features up and coming organ students from across the country. They will travel to Evansville to perform on the renowned C.B. Fisk organ in the Sanctuary of First Presbyterian Church.

Playing a 30-minute recital on Sunday, October 3, at 4:30 p.m. is Janet Yieh. Janet is a senior at St. Stephen's and St. Agnes High School in Alexandria, Virginia. She began piano at age 4 with Mrs. Rwei-Hwa Shyu and has continued with Dr. Carol Prochazka at the Peabody Preparatory School. At 11 years old she was the youngest pianist to win the Potomac Organ Institute's scholarship, receiving a year of organ lessons with Mrs. Victoria Harding. She continued her organ studies with Dr. Wayne Earnest of the Old Presbyterian Meeting House for two years. Since 2007 Janet has been a student of Dr. John Walker of Peabody Conservatory.

Janet attended the Interlochen Arts Camp in Michigan in 2007 and the POE Advanced program for the next three summers. As a sophomore in 2009, she was awarded second prize in the AGO-sponsored Oklahoma City University Organ Competition. She was also one of three national finalists in the 2010 Albert Schweitzer Organ Festival.

Janet has given several piano and organ recitals including an organ duet concert with Dr. Earnest at the Meeting House benefitting a local charity (2007), three organ recitals in Taipei, Taiwan (2008) and performances in local nursing homes. She was a

featured performer in the Organ Spectacular Concert at Brown Memorial Church in Baltimore (2008) and gave a solo organ recital at the Meeting House benefitting an international charity (2009). Janet often serves as guest organist for worship services at schools and churches. In addition to piano and organ, she plays violin in the orchestra, sings in an a Capella group, and leads the Handbell Choir at her high school.



Following Janet's recital, the Choir of First Presbyterian Church will lead us in Choral Evening Prayer. This reflective and contemplative service is the perfect way to bring the Lord's Day to a close.

Following Choral Evening Prayer, you are invited to share in an Agape Meal. We will provide the main course. You are asked to bring your favorite side dish or dessert. Place settings and beverages will be provided.

This is a unique opportunity to invite your friends, relatives, neighbors, and business associates to experience First Pres. We especially encourage you to bring the young musicians in your life to hear Janet Yieh. She will inspire them to greater musical heights. Who knows – they may even want to practice a little more!

Raising a Witness for Peace

2010 is the thirtieth anniversary of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program and the Peacemaking Offering, following the adoption by the General Assembly of *Peacemaking: The Believers' Calling*, which called for a new emphasis on peacemaking across the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

The Peacemaking Offering was created in 1980 to support the efforts of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to live out a deeper commitment to peacemaking as part of our faithfulness to God. It is one of four special offerings designated by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s General Assembly.

We will receive the Offering on World Communion Sunday, October 3.

Each congregation is encouraged to retain 25 percent of the Offering it receives to use for local ministries of peacemaking within the church and its community. Twenty-five percent is used by presbyteries and synods, and 50 percent is used by the General Assembly ministries through the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program.

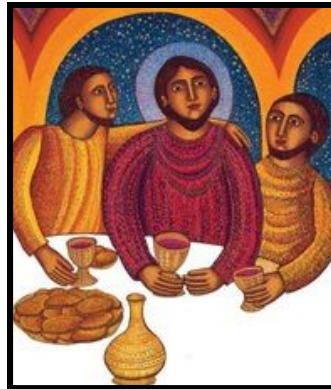
We encourage you to be as generous as possible in supporting the Peacemaking Offering.

We also encourage you to participate in raising a witness to peace on Tuesday, October 12. Beginning at 7:00 p.m., we will gather in the Sanctuary for "Stop the Hate," a rally and candlelight vigil for bring hate speech and hate crimes to an end. A multi-media presentation and a few remarks will be followed by a candlelight procession to the Four Freedoms Monument.

This is an extraordinary opportunity for people of all ages – but especially high school and college aged folks – to take a stand against the hate that influences our culture in so many ways. Whether it is hatred towards those of different religious traditions, hatred against those of different political views, hatred against those of differing sexual orientations - hatred is all around us. Jesus reminded us that the second greatest commandment was to "love your neighbor as yourself."

But our words, by our giving, and by our actions, we can raise a witness to bring hate speech, hate crimes, and hateful bullying to and end.

Let us work together to be a people of peace, joining with God to bring forth a world of peace. Join us on Tuesday, October 12, for "Stop the Hate."

Organ Recital Announced

A very special organ recital has been scheduled for Sunday, October 17 at 4:00 p.m. We are pleased to welcome to First Presbyterian Church, two exceptional organ students from Indiana University's Jacob School of Music. Sarah Moon and Sunghee Kim will share a recital on the C. B. Fisk organ.



Sarah Moon is a native of Toledo, Ohio and is currently in her second year of doctoral study at Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music, studying under Dr. Janette Fishell. She is an associate instructor in the organ department and teaches secondary organ students.

Through the five-year dual program offered at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, Sarah received her Bachelor of Music

in organ performance and Master of Music in Historical Performance in 2009, studying organ with James David Christie and harpsichord with Webb Wiggins. Sarah was also awarded the Selby Harlan Houston Prize in Music Theory and the James H. Hall Prize in Music History while at Oberlin.

Sunghee Kim earned her undergraduate degree in organ performance under Heesung Kim at Ewha Women's University in Seoul, Korea. During her time there she accompanied the acclaimed Korean Students' Glee Club from 1998 to 2002. Sunghee won the graduate first prize in the 2004 William C. Hall Pipe Organ Competition in San Antonio, TX, and the National Organ Competition at First Presbyterian Church in Ft. Wayne, IN in 2006. Sunghee received her Master's degree in organ performance under Dr. Eschbach at the University of North Texas in Denton. Sunghee is currently pursuing a Doctorate in Organ performance under Dr. Christopher Young at the Indiana University.

Walk to Make a Difference

2010 CROP Walk

Please join Mission Committee for the 38th annual CROP (Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty) Walk for hunger. Jeff Lyons of channel 14 WFIE will be joining the walk this year as the Grand Marshall.

Church World Service, a cooperative ministry of 36 denominations throughout the world, receives 75% of the proceeds from the walk and the Tri-State Food Bank and the Emergency Food Pantry System of Evansville each receive 12½% of the proceeds. The Food Bank serves food pantries, soup kitchens and other programs feeding the hungry in 33 tri-state counties. The Food Pantry System will serve more than 17,000 four-day supplies of food to local families this year. Many churches in the Evansville area are all walking for one common goal: to stop hunger.



This year's walk is scheduled for Saturday, November 6 and starts from East Side Christian Church, 2001 Bayard Park Drive, continuing through residential neighborhoods, arriving at a mid-point at Neu Chapel at U of E, and returning by a different route to East Side Christian Church.

Registration starts at 9:00 a.m. and the walk begins at 10:00 a.m. on November 6. There will be lots of activities prior to the walk including the River City Clowns making balloon characters and painting faces. Pets are welcome on the route. Recycle Your Unused Medications

Did you know more than 4 billion prescriptions are written annually and it is estimated that about 40% go unused? That's about 200 million pounds of drugs. This accessibility to drugs has resulted in an increased misuse of medications across the country through experimental use. It was recently reported that 9.8% of individuals older than 12 years who are receiving addiction treatment admitted to abusing prescription drugs. The problem doesn't stop there. Improper disposal harms the environment through an increase in heavy metals and steroids in our water systems. Our problem in Evansville is not as severe as other places but is on the rise.

The National Community Pharmacists Association has launched a "Dispose My Meds" campaign. More than 800 community pharmacies in 40 states have signed on. Just bring the drugs to a participating pharmacy

and it will send them to a medical-waste-disposal facility. Paul's Pharmacy (both locations: Professional Boulevard and Franklin Street) is our local pharmacy to dispose of unused meds. Or you can get a postage-paid envelope from the pharmacy and mail the drugs from your home. For more information, see DisposeMyMeds.org.

**Glenwood Neighborhood Tours:
October 6 and October 13**

The Glenwood Initiative is a comprehensive effort among many partners to revitalize the neighborhood, identified by the Evansville Department of Metropolitan Development as an area of need. Of the approximately 600 structures in that area, about one-third are abandoned and another third are rental properties, many of which are in need of repair. Additionally, 99% of the student body at the Glenwood Leadership Academy is eligible for free or reduced lunch.

The overall goal of the initiative is to create affordable housing, decrease transient rates among Glenwood residents, and increase graduation and post-secondary education rates. Habitat began building in its newest development, Shadewood Place, in the heart of the Glenwood neighborhood in August and will complete 19 homes by next year. Over the past year, the E-VSC renovated Glenwood School and this year opened it as the new Glenwood Leadership Academy, a K-8 facility.

The Mission Committee and Sister Jane Michele McClure of Habitat have put together a small tour to see how the Glenwood Neighborhood is progressing and what their future plans are. There are two tours available. Wednesday, October 6 at 10:00 a.m. and Wednesday, October 13 at 5:30 p.m. If you are interested in joining this small van tour, you must RSVP to the church office at 423-6297 or firstpres@firstpresevansville.com as seating is limited.

United Caring Shelter

Each month the Mission Committee features an organization that the committee supports on a regular basis, that is in need of items to help them provide for those in need. In October, we are looking for items for United Caring Shelters (UCS). United Caring Shelters is a non-profit homeless shelter, serving the needy and homeless with dignity and respect through faith, located at 6th and Ingle Streets.

UCS supports and encourages their guests to a life of greater dignity, self-worth, and harmony as they struggle for wholeness in our fragile humanity. They seek to serve as a community that will actively work to increase awareness of the issues of poverty and homelessness.

400 individuals are served each day, one-third of which are children. UCS hosts a night shelter for 62 men, and has 21 sectional and transitional apartments. UCS is also the only local shelter to offer showers and laundry services. Many social services are offered through the shelter. 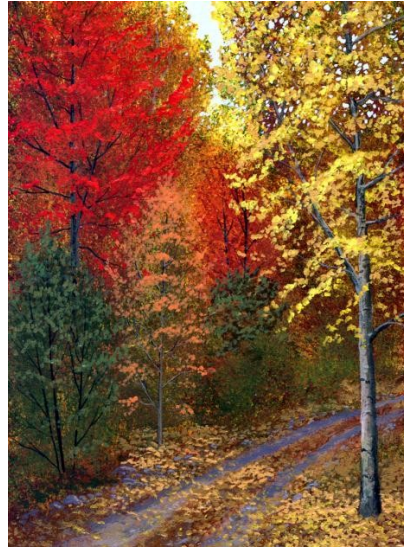
